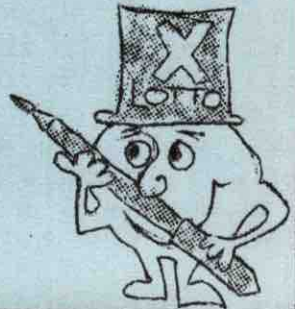

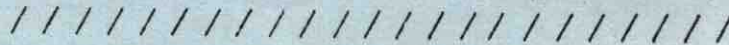

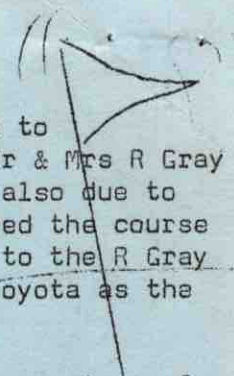
HOUSE-HOLD HINTS - DON'T THROW AWAY THOSE LEFTOVERS

SUNDAY 23 October - HIT-OFF from COPLEY Grid to Golf Course No. 9 Hole - OPEN DAY - 1 Club event

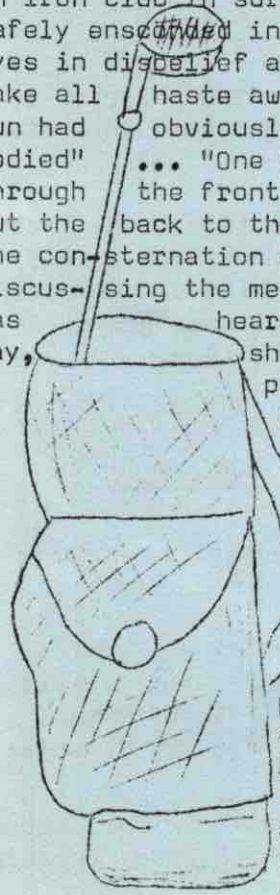

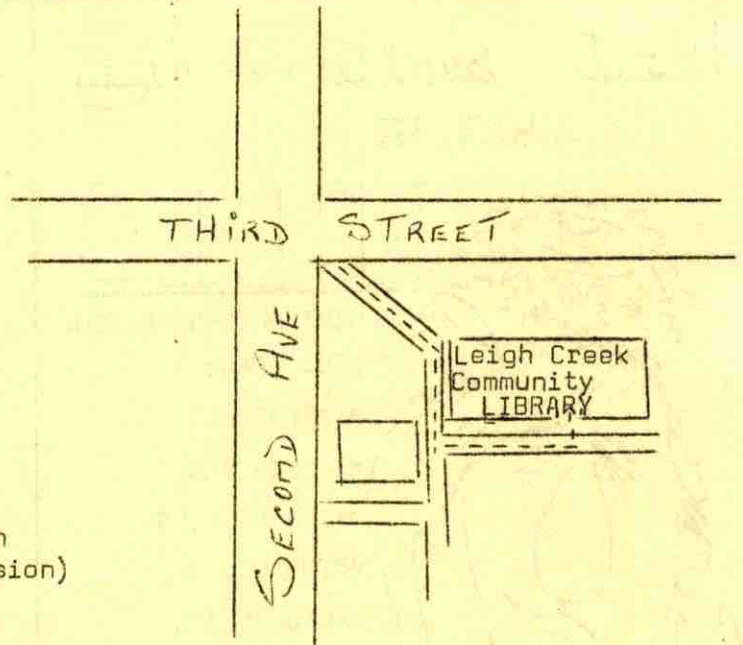
The library will be open during the following times:-

LOCAL CITIZEN TO RECEIVE ST JOHN AMBULANCE AWARD

The Order of St John has much pleasure in awarding a Priority Vote of Thanks to Mr C W MANN in recognition of the service given to St John. The award will be presented to Mr Mann by the Governor of Sth Australia, Mr Keith Seaman at the Ambulance Brigade Annual Review in Adelaide on Sunday, 6 November at 10.30am.

We, the people of Leigh Creek and District, CONGRATULATE WALLY. He has had a long service with the St John Ambulance Brigade

His first interest in First Aid was when he was still in primary school. After leaving school Wally liked to "sit-in" on lectures given by the travelling Sth Australian Railways First Aid lecturer, but it was not until he went to Western Australia where he worked underground in the gold mines at Norseman that First Aid became a serious thing to Wally. He joined the class and passed the examination set to become a member of the Underground Rescue Team.

On returning to S.A. Wally worked in Pt Lincoln where he became actively involved with the Air Raid emergency "black-out" rehearsals with the Army, Navy, Boy Scouts and Dad's Army Groups. Many and varied First Aid duties were carried out in the Lower Eyre Peninsular area and ranged from Country Shows, sporting events, Rodeos, beach picnics (Wally liked these - plenty of ice-cream), long distance motor rallies and roller skates (most popular pet-aversion).

It was at Kadina where plenty of hard work was the order of the day, that Wally and other members of the Brigade designed and built Australia's first and only Trailer Ambulance. The members bought a caravan chassis and on it they built a caravan-like structure, but instead of a side door they had a double back door. The ambulance was very good and you could stand up in it - a difficult procedure in modern ambulances. The trailer ambulance was towed by an old "Buick Six" motor car, and although the rides were not the best, this unit gave long and faithful service until it was replaced by a modern ambulance.

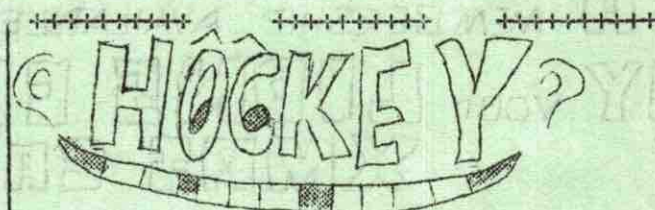

A point of interest was that of the St John Ambulance Brigade Summer Uniform. Leigh Creek members hold the "first for Sth Australia honour" in this. Headquarters was approached and rules were amended so that Leigh Creek members could have a cooler summer uniform to suit the climatic conditions of the area - now, the remainder of the State have Summer Uniforms also.

Work became demanding and health was not as he would have always wished it to be and so after long consideration, Wally eventually resigned from the Brigade, however, he still takes an interest in the work and gets great pleasure from discussing aspects of the work with members.

Wally would like to take this opportunity and space to thank the members of his family for their understanding in being "away from home" for all those thousands of hours during his First Aid career. He is also grateful for the help, advice, co-operation and encouragement which was given to him by members of St John both from his own Section and from Headquarters.

Wally's first award was the St John Ambulance Bronze Medal in 1944, followed by the Silver Medal for Service in 1959. Now after 29 years service with the Brigade he is to receive a "PRIORITY VOTE OF THANKS AWARD" - CONGRATULATIONS once more from us all Wally, and well done.
