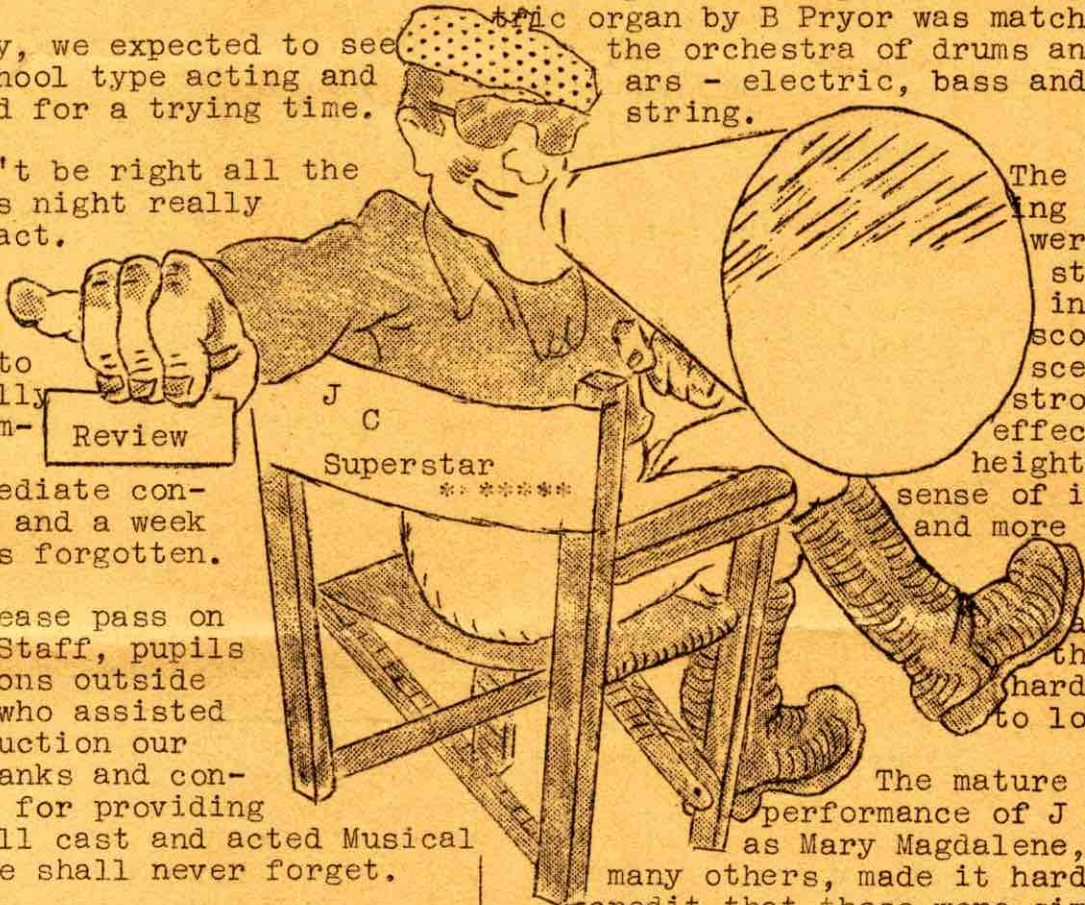
"JC SUPERSTAR AT LEIGH CREEK

Residents of Leigh Creek have been talking about its overwhelming success. It was staged in the Community Hall on two week-nights, 29-30 September. No-one expected that a musical produced by actors from a bush school could reach the front rank of performance at one bound. From every aspect - direction, singing, orchestra, lighting, costume - it took the audience by surprise. For one viewer, the most moving aspect was the complete rapport between staff and students who shared equally in the

acting, from the Headmaster downwards.

Amid such talent, names would seem invidious. But two sources of inspiration were obvious. The part of JC Superstar himself, sung by C J Ferguson with such sincerity and sensitive restraint, simply had to call forth such a magnificent response by the rest of the cast.

The inspired accompaniment at the electric organ by B Pryor was matched by the orchestra of drums and guitars - electric, bass and 12 string.



The lighting effects were quite startling in the scourging scene. The stroboscopic effect heightened the sense of its agony and more than one person said afterwards they could hardly bear to look on.

The mature singing performance of J Mengerson as Mary Magdalene, and of many others, made it hard to credit that these were simply pupils of the school.

The faultless timing, the professional teamwork, all come back to one thing - the total rapport between staff and pupils. It achieved a combined result that could never have been attained in any number of solo performances. This augurs well for the success of the school in its everyday tasks and for the future of its scholars.

One is left with a sense or regret that this performance could not be taken in its entirety and shown to many other centres. This kind of experience should be more widely shared."

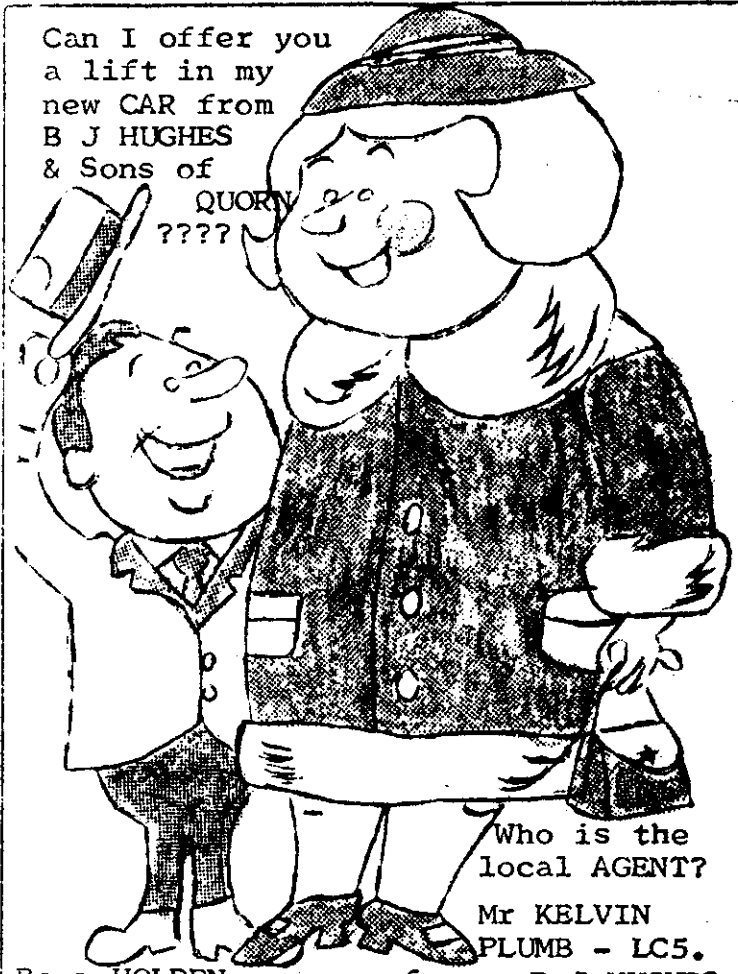

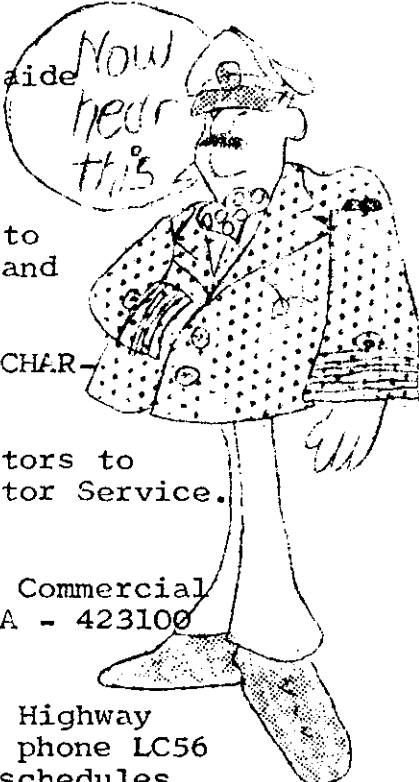

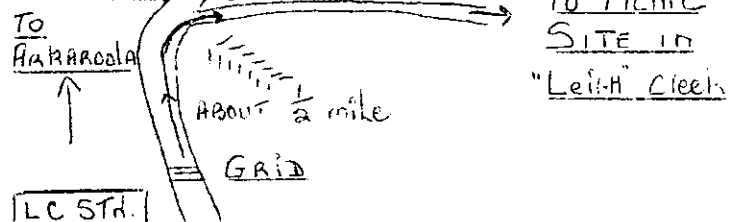

# Green Thumb Reports

Mr NOEL LOTHIAN of the Adelaide Botanic Gardens, has recently reported on the Garden Competition. Below is a brief summary of his comments.

He noted that the number of entries was down on previous years, but the standard was maintained. Numbers have progressively fallen from 80 in 1973 to 58 this year. Good entries in the Restricted Section were noted.

The late season resulted in lawns being not up to usual standards at the time of judging, and roses had not reached their peak.

Bulbs could be used much more. Most varieties grow very well at Leigh Creek. Gardens would also be brightened by the use of more annuals.

The need to provide protection on the west and north sides of homes was again stressed. This can be very well done with vines or medium sized trees.

The need to be sure of the requirements of the class contested was mentioned.

The Country style section has been established to cater for those householders who wish to have a pleasant, shady, but importantly, an easy maintained garden.

The suburban type garden must not only be carefully designed with trees and shrubs, excellent lawns, plenty of colour, a good vegetable garden and collection of fruit trees, but overall it must be carefully and thoroughly maintained.

To get a good idea of the requirements, it is suggested people take a look at the winning gardens for this year, namely - JOHN TAYLOR, 15 Second Avenue for the Country Section and Mrs ENID KENDRICK, 16 Fourth Street for the Suburban Section. Both gardens are good examples of the requirements.

It was pleasing to note that shade houses are appearing. This allows for a wider range of plants to be grown many of which can be used indoors instead of flowers.

Let's all aim to make the Garden Competition of 1976 the biggest and brightest yet.

## VEGIES

Many vegies can now be planted. Lettuces for summer salads are always very popular. Be sure though to select seeds of a summer variety. See the notes on the back of packets. Time is right for beans, radish, squash, melons, pumpkin, beetroot, sweetcorn and many others. TOO LATE now for peas, cabbage and cauliflower.

## VINES

Most grapes are now in flower. Watch carefully for MILDEW. It is advised to give one more spray of Bordeaux mix.

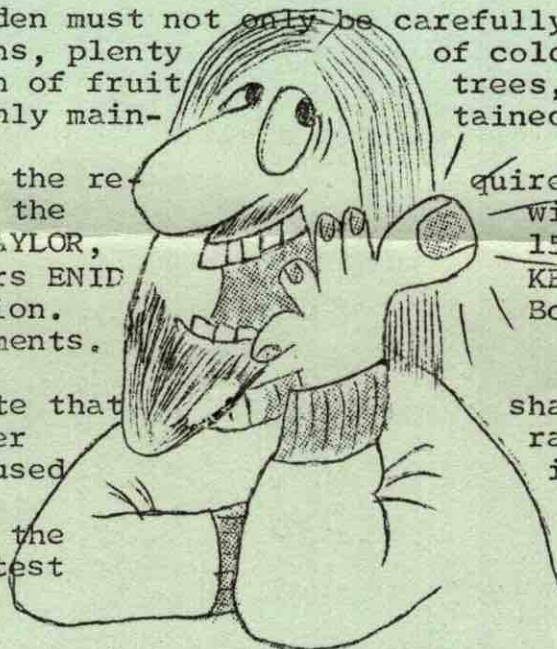
## YOUNG FRUIT TREES

Very light summer pruning may now be done. This is done only to make sure the tree grows to the required shape. Keep it very light. Mainly remove shoots in the middle of the tree.

## TREE OF THE WEEK

Have a look at the Silky Oak Tree (Grevillea robusta) in JIM REID'S front yard - 15 Fourth Street.

At the moment it's in full bloom with its masses of orange flowers.

## Television Leigh Creek

As you may have heard, agreement in principle has been reached on the funding for a television repeater station (colour) to be installed at Leigh Creek.

Now that funds are allocated there are the technical and operating considerations to be investigated such as location and height of aerial, equipment location, method of operating, maintenance procedures, tape transport etc.

These investigations will involve various organisations and Government Departments such as Australian Broadcast Board of Control, Australian Broadcast Commission, Telecon and ETSA. Although we are pressing to solve these problems quickly to achieve an early operating date, the negotiations may well take considerable time.

A point of interest which is worth passing on is that it seems that not all television sets will be compatible with our transmitter, but a set which will operate from our station will operate elsewhere. I understand that this still leaves a good range of television receivers to choose from but it would be best to wait for details before buying a receiver.

We will of course keep you all informed of progress as the negotiations proceed.
