COMMUNITY AFFAIRS CORNER

On Wednesday, 28 October 1976, local Justices of the Peace attended a short training and discussion session on the treatment of juvenile offenders in South Australia. The opportunity for such a Semina arose when two Social Workers from the Department for Community Welfare, both experienced in dealing with juvenile offenders, visited Leigh Creek as part of a Far Northern evaluation study. They were Helen Nicholls, Court Services Supervisor and Sally McGregor, Supervisor of the Juvenile Assessment Centre.

During the session, which lasted two and a half hours, Helen and Sally explained to the Justices some of the changes that have taken place over the past few years with regards to the treatment of juvenile offenders. One of these is the increasing use of juvenile aid panels. Such a panel usually consists of a senior Police officer and an experienced social worker from the Dpt for Community Welfare, but which can include other people if necessary i.e. a Justice of the Peace or a Senior School teacher. It provides a forum for the juvenile offender and his family to discuss the offence and any other problems facing them, with people who are genuinely concerned for their welfare. In a flexible and informed way, young people and their families can be assisted to overcome personal and/or social difficulties which may have contributed to the child coming into conflict with the law. Panels are not intended to be a channel for retribution or punishment, but rather as a tool for help. They were introduced in recognition of the fact that many children commit relatively minor offences during their development and that an appearance in the Juvenile Court at that stage in their life often has harmful effects in terms of the child being labelled a delinquent and being stigmatised. Research has shown that over 80% of children who appear before a Juvenile Aid Panel, do not come under notice again. So basically they provide an alternative for Children aged between 10 and 16 years, who would previously have been faced with an appearance in court and a subsequent court record.

One of the ways the Panel can assist is to encourage, help and advise both the child and his parents on how to prevent further offences. Another is to get the child and the Parents to undertake formal agreements, such as for the child to carry out certain tasks, where appropriate, so as to provide him with an opportunity to learn responsibilities. More serious offences of course generally are dealt with by the Juvenile Court.

Another development has been the establishment of Assessment Centres throughout the state, the one of Pt Augusta being the closest to Leigh Creek. The idea behind assessment is to enable thorough examination of the child, his health, his personal circumstances taking into account environmental and personal factors and his general behaviour patterns resulting from them. Finally an assessment is made of which is the best way of helping the child to overcome his problems. Generally this is done by way of treatment, rehabilitative correction or through a total re-education process. Mostly such an assessment not only involves the child, but his parents and other children as well, setting out a total programme in which the whole family can participate. Generally children are referred to such an Assessment Centre by the Juvenile Court or a Juvenile Aid Panel, where it is felt that more information on the child and his total situation is required. This then helps Judges, Magistrates or Panel Members to an appropriate order. What is often not realized by Parents is that a child need not necessarily be a budding delinquent to be assessed. Where they feel that they would like help in dealing with a child who has behaviour or other problems, they should feel free to approach a Community Welfare Worker from the Department and discuss the problems of an assessment with him or her.

The Seminar brought out some interesting facts. Although juvenile delinquency in the large cities such as Adelaide, Whyalla and Port Augusta was increasing, it was not a big problem in communities such as Leigh Creek, Copley, Marree and Oodnadatta. Generally offences committed were of a nature not considered serious. However, when juveniles did commit offences such as vandalism or illegally using a car, they often did so in a group.

Concern was expressed at the meeting that, while it seemed that offences were often committed by juveniles out of boredom, there were very few social activities available to the 10 - 17 year old groups where they could get together without the need to hang around street corners. This seemed to apply particularly to Leigh Creek and Copley.

At closing the Semina, members expressed their appreciation at having had the opportunity of sharing information with Helen and Sally. It was felt that such periodic hearing was valuable in keeping up to date with new ideas and new ways of dealing with kids in trouble.

GREEN THUMB

ZUCCHINIS in the home gardens are extremely easy to grow. The plants require only about a square metre of space in open sunlight. They are highly productive.

Soil Preparation

Dig the soil to fork depth and rake. Dig in decomposed animal manure or compost and add about 200 gms (1 cup) of complete D or other complete fertiliser/square meter.

Sowing

Plant the seeds in clumps of 2-3 seeds and thin out to one plant as the seedlings strengthen. Plant the seeds 25-30 mm (1-1½") deep and cover with 1" of lawn clippings. Keep moist but not wet for 10 days.

Growth Habit

ZUCCHINIS are bush marrows and belong to the same family as pumpkins, squash, melons and cucumbers. They do not run like other members of the family and thus do not require such large areas.

Watering

Zucchini have large leaves and thus lose a lot of water through their leaves. As they get large, water twice a week with heavy soaking to prevent wilting.

Flowering

Zucchini, like all its family, have male and female flowers on the one plant. Male flowers are on long stems and set no fruit. Female flowers are on short stems and have a small zucchini under the flower.

Picking

For maximum production, pick your crop every second day to ensure continued flowering. Pick the small zucchinis with a knife, being careful not to cut the plant. If left unpicked, the fruit grow rapidly and flowering falls off. Pick just before or just after the flower falls from the fruit. At that stage the fruit will be 8-10 cms (3-4") long.

Uses - Zucchini have a wide range of uses. They may be sliced and lightly fried in butter, lightly steamed or boiled whole, or cut into cubes and included in fresh salads.

Pests

The major pest is the pumpkin beetle and the spotted lady bird. These can usually be removed by hand and squashed. If infestations are heavy, dust the plants with "Deris Dust".

SUMMER WATERING - COOLING - RUBBISH

ETSA has asked all residents of Leigh Creek and users of Arona water to take note of the following advice for the convenience of all.

Summer Watering

Hand watering only is permitted on WEDNESDAY of each week.

During summer, water use increases greatly but should be kept to a minimum. Home gardeners are advised to use sprinklers during the cooler part of the day and to avoid watering on windy days in the hot weather. Use water but DON'T WASTE IT.

Air Coolers - Leigh Creek

For an evaporative air cooler to be effective it must be clean. None are self cleaning. Change the water every 2 to 3 days if yours is the aquacooler (revolving pad) type and clean out the accumulated silt regularly. Salting or clogging of the pad is normally the result of poor cleaning habits.

Household Rubbish Collection - Leigh Creek

From Tuesday, 23 November, household garbage will be collected on TUESDAY and FRIDAY of each week. If you have garbage for collection on Tuesday leave your bin on the footpath as you have been doing on Fridays. This additional service will be given for the SUMMER MONTHS ONLY.

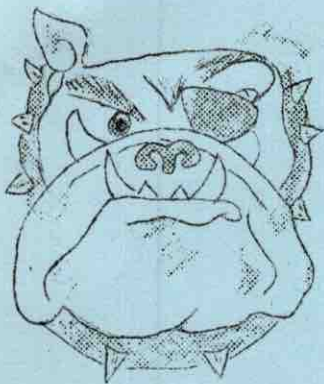

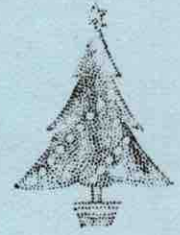

This is an urgent request as he is staying temporarily with a family which expects to move by December.

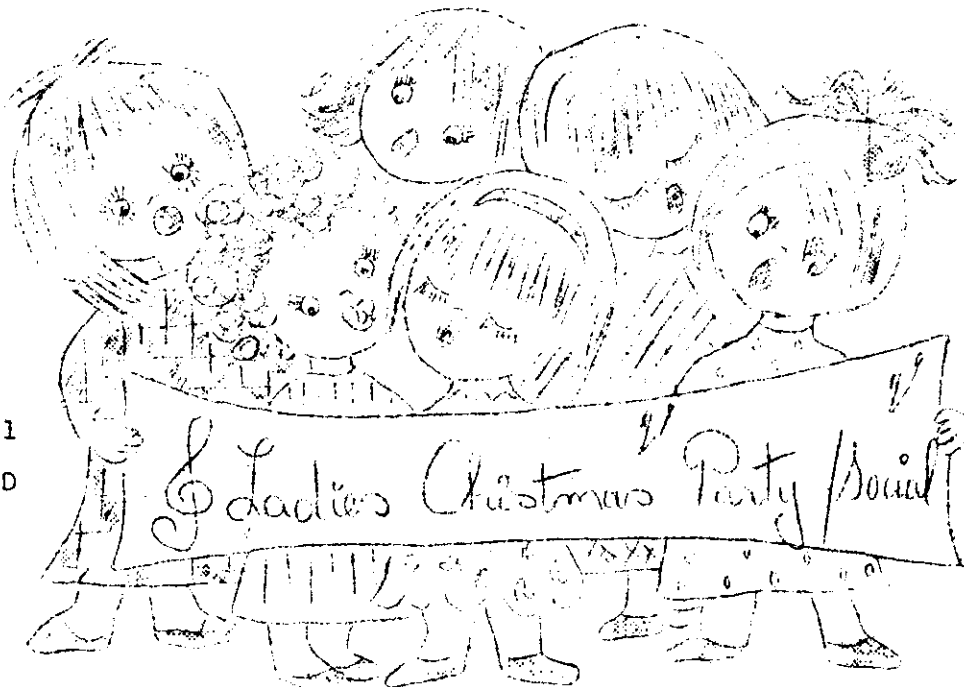

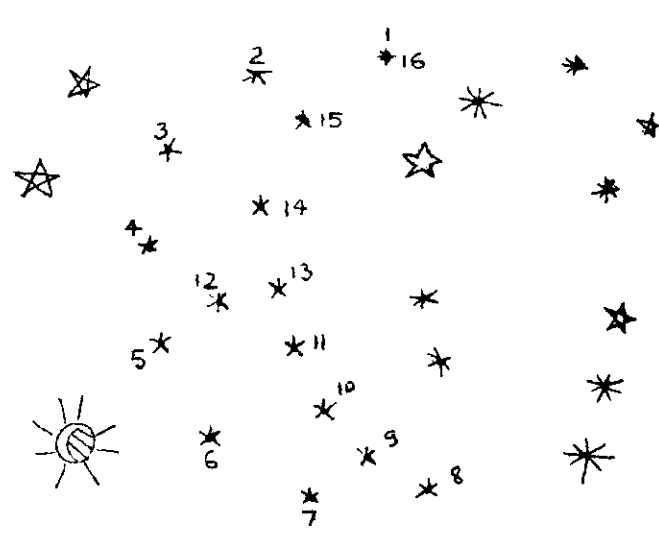
