


VACANCY for part time LABORATORY ASSISTANT

Swimming Pool News

It now seems that summer has started and we are now running all sessions subject to the temperature being over 75°F.

Our new attendant is settling down into the job and seems to be getting good co-operation from pool users. However, we would like to remind everyone that the rules set by the committee are for the safety and benefit of everybody.

Running One child has been hurt when he slipped and fell when running.

He had been warned not to run only a few minutes before. It could happen to you!

Dogs Obviously we cannot have all the town dogs in the pool. If your dog likes to follow you make sure he is fastened up before you set off to the pool.

Toddlers Pre-school children are not allowed into the pool unless accompanied by a parent or an adult (over 18 years). This person must look after the toddler. Our attendant Thursday cannot be responsible for these kiddies.

Little Pool We ask pool users not to walk through the little pool to avoid unnecessary contamination of the water. Adults are especially requested to set a good example.

First Aid Exercise As you may know there is an emergency rescue procedure set up in case of emergency. On Sunday at 3.30 pm the St John will go through the full procedure with a "drowning" swimmer. The attendant and the ambulance first aiders will be available following the exercise for instruction on mouth to mouth resucitation and to answer questions.


Results of recent matches: SUNDAY 28-11-71.
