




Coal Deliveries-

Coal is also available from the heap adjacent to the wash-down car ramp for those who prefer to pick their own.

This service will continue through the winter months.



COCKROF CH ERADICATION

Cockroaches appear in greater numbers where they can find plenty to eat. Cleanliness is your first defence against this household pest.

To supplement your cleaning programme you can use a number of chemicals. One of these is now available locally in an aerosol spray can. It is sold commercially as "BAYGON INDUSTRIAL AEROSCL".

Remove all items from cupboards and place them on tables in the centre of the room and cover them with a table cloth or sheet.

If there are cupboards with false bottoms you should drill small holes in the false bottoms about 9" apart and just large enough to spray through.

Start spraying in the higher cupboards and systematically work downwards.

The aim is to drench all cracks, crevices and hiding places of the cockroaches with the spray. The space between the cupboards framework and the walls, the cupboard shelves and the walls, the underside and back of the drawers, under the cupboard false bottoms, out of the way areas behind sinks, stoves (but not inside the stove), should all be examined and sprayed if necessary.


This should be done at night. Next morning wash out all the cupboards, shelves and bench tops. The building walls, cupboard framework, the area behind the sinks and other out of the way places need not be washed.

The treatment should be followed up by making weekly inspections and even if only one more cockroach is seen, more insecticide must be applied. In any case a follow-up application should be carried out each month for three months. The follow-up application need not be as extensive as the initial treatment and provided that care is used in directing the spray, the cupboards need not be emptied.

A most important part of the treatment is the follow-up work. With almost 100% kill on the initial treatment and no follow-up work, the infestation could re-establish itself within one or two weeks.

As you can see, there is NO EASY WAY OUT ONCE THEY ARE IN.





A Fry in The Life of The Great Scholar Fu combines a play from Honan Province, from the ancient book of comedies (Ha Ha Chiao) and scenes from various Chinese operas. All are works by unknown Chinese authors.

This play was originally adapted from the Chinese and translated into German by Carl Weher, Peter Palitzsch and Bertolt Brecht. It was first produced in 1955 by the famous Berliner Ensemble under the direction of Brecht.

Brecht founded the Berliner Ensemble in 1949 in East Berlin after receiving substantial support from the Communist Government. It was a turning point in his life after years of bitter exile abroad he was able to return to Germany and establish a company which was to rapidly rise to world wide acclaim.

Brechts work is unique and its originality springs from his concept of the form and function of drama. He resolved to deminish and if possible do away with standard theatrical effects. He attempted to destroy any illusion of reality and any identification of character that would produce feelings of pity, fear, or involvement by an audience, in other words he wanted audiences to think about the message of the play rather than become emotionally involved. His characters were usually caricatures or distorted one dimensional mouth pieces. Despite its unconventional form Brechts plays and productions are rich, satirical, broadly comic, and vastly entertaining.

In this production of <u>A Day in The Life of The Great Scholar Wu</u> we attempt to meet Brecht at least halfway our characters are all clowns in a pantomime troupe and in the opening scene they appear as themselves, players on have stage setting up to perform a play for you and destroying all the conventional illusion of the theatre. The clowns jump in and out of different cartoon characters in a series of seven short scenes. Their comical routines and antics are never allowed to appear remotely realistic. All the scenarios are frequently interrupted and punctuated by musical passages.

All Berliner Ensemble productions were flavoured with Marxist ideaology and each play has at least one sometimes very subtle socialist message for the audience. In this production we have delved into Chinese political philosophy and taken Mao Tse-Tung's bitter attacks on "Bourgeiouse Art and Capitalistic Culture" as the underlying motive for our play. It is a subtle even gentle piece of propaganda but it will serve to illustrate this unique form of theatre.

The character of Scholar Wu is played not as an ancient sage but as a young parasitic drop-out or bum who 'bludges' on the rich and well to do under a guise of an intellectual and man of letters. His apportunism is obvious yet hilarious and the collection of toadying servants grasping landowners and silly old women will certainly keep you vastly entertained. Yet don't be mislead there is a serious underlying motive to the play. We hope this will all be apparent to you and in the words of Brecht: "The thing is, I don't know what will come out when I do my job as best I can'. Perhaps you our audience will know.
