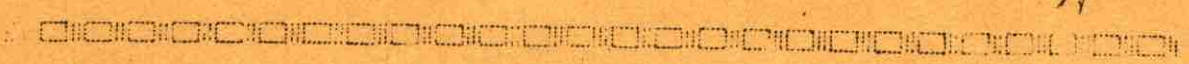
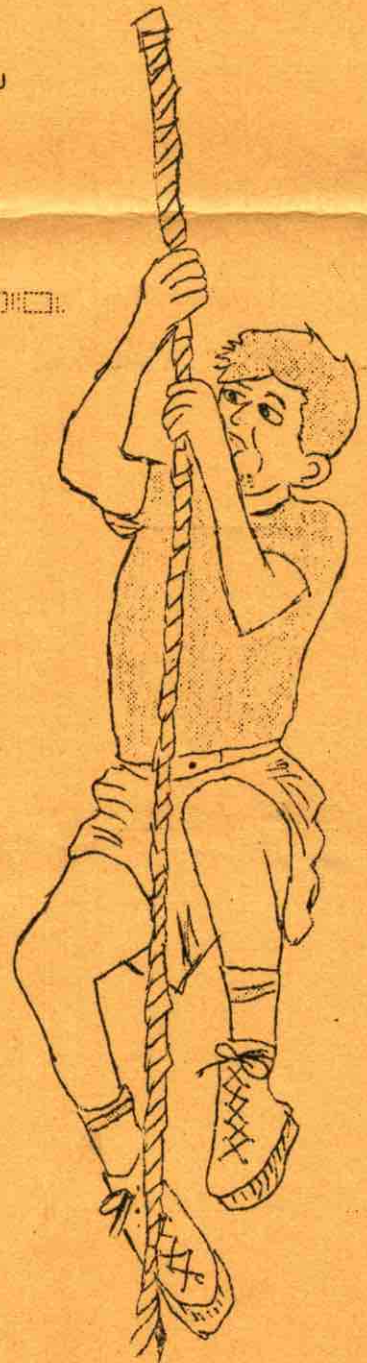

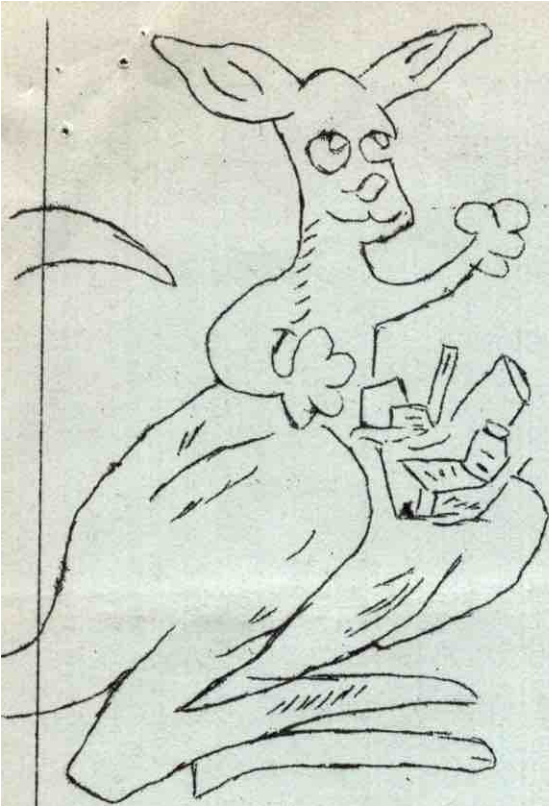

Medical

MEASLES - Lirugen vaccine.

Measles can cause complication involving lung and brain damage. Measles is preventable, and the vaccine safe. The aim is to immunise ALL children against measles as soon as possible after they are TWELVE MONTHS old. Make appointment before 16 June 1972 for administration 9.am - 5.am on 24 June 1972, at the Hospital.

POLIO MYELITIS - Sabin vaccine.

The Department of Public Health recommends that ALL people should receive a basic course of SABIN vaccine (3 doses at intervals of not less than 8 weeks). They expect protection from this to be life-long. They recommend the SABIN course even though doses of SALK vaccine may have been received in the past. The ultimate aim is to immunise all infants in the first year of life. Make appointment by 24 June 1972 for first dose 10.am - 12 noon on 1st July 1972, at the Hospital.

DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS - CDT

Parents you are URGENTLY requested to bring your children to the Hospital for a booster of CDT. If your child has not received a booster for the past 5 years then the child is now eligible to have one. Injections etc are to be given on the 24 June.

ALSO don't forget the Tetanus Toxoid (for immunization of adults and children over the age of 12 years against Tetanus. (Booster adviseable every 5 years).

The following is a letter from the Prime Ministers Department in reply to our request for Television coverage in this area.

31 May 1972

Dear Mr Ragless,

I refer to your letter of 5 May 1972 and that of Mr Barber of 17 Feb. 1972 to the Prime Minister the Rt. Hon. William McMahon, on behalf of the Far Northern Development Association, concerning the introduction of a television service to the Leigh Creek area. I apologise for the delay in replying to you.

I have been advised by the Chairman of the Australian Broadcasting Control Board that your Assoc. has on a number of occasions, previously approached the Board on this matter. I am sure you will appreciate that, in planning the television services, a basic consideration is the cost of provision of service in relation to the population which will be served. There are, therefore, obviously much greater difficulties in providing service to remote and sparsely populated areas such as Leigh Creek than in the case of the more populous areas of the Commonwealth.

Because of the very high costs involved in the provision of service by means of high power stations, it has only been practicable to approach the extension of service to such areas by means of the provision of low powered stations to provide service to the concentrations of population concerned. This was the approach which was adopted in the most recent stage of television development, namely the seventh stage, involving the establishment of 38 low powered stations in relatively remote areas throughout the Commonwealth.

The cost of a high powered station, which normally would provide a service within a 60 mile radius of the transmitter, is of the order of \$600,000, and even this coverage would be less than that mentioned as the area of your concern. On the basis of the population estimates quoted in your letter and relating this information to the cost and service coverage of a high powered station, the per capita cost would be of the order of \$170 whereas the overall cost for the provision of service in the seventh stage of television development is of the order of \$45 per head.

There is little I can add to the information your Assoc. has already been given concerning the provision of television to Leigh Creek. However, it is Government policy that the television service should be extended as widely as is economically and technically possible, and your further representations have been brought to the notice of the Board in connection with its continuing studies of ways and means of further developing the services.

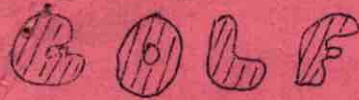

11/5/72 The Associates played the first leg of the Hidden Holes - Stroke which was also the monthly medal competition.

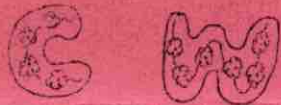

The roll call for our meeting on Thursday 25 May was "My Mother's favourite song". Some real old songs were remembered and some quite modern ones.

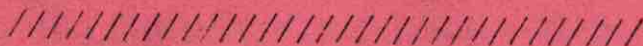

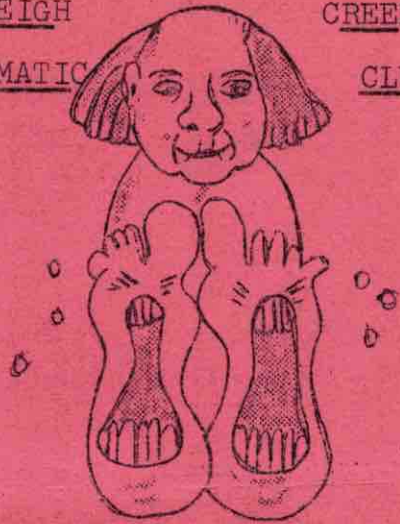
