FAR NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Extract from letter to Mr Barber, Secretary, FNDA, from Mr G R Broomhill, Minister assisting the Premier.

"The Premier made representations to the Commonwealth Government and the Commonwealth Minister for the Media has now forwarded a reply, a copy of which is enclosed for your information."

The following is the copy of this letter:-

"Dear Mr Dunstan,

I refer again to your personal representations on behalf of the Leigh Creek Combined Union Council concerning television in relation to the Leigh Creek area.

I have discussed this matter with the Chairman of the Australian Broadcasting Control Board who has indicated that the position has not changed since you and I made our representations last year to the former Postmaster-General on behalf of the Council. As you know, there are real difficulties associated with the provision of a television service to this area, and the following information provided by the Board will give you some idea of the problems.

The Leigh Creek coal-mining settlement has a stable population of just under 1,000 within range of a possible television station. A service could be provided to the settlement by means of a series of microwave repeater stations northward from Pt. Augusta, at a cost of about \$300,000 which is approximately \$300 per head of population served. By comparison, you are no doubt aware that the current Stage 7 of television development will serve about 110,000 people at a cost of \$5,000,000 or about \$45 per head, and also that there are still considerable concentrations of populations at present without TV in other areas of the Commonwealth which could be served for \$50 to \$100 per head.

A second-class television service could be provided at Leigh Creek by the establishment of a video-tape "repeater station", as has been carried out at a number of mining settlements in Northern Australia, provided the employer (The Electricity Trust of South Australia) accepts the obligation in view of the settlement's importance. Such stations are owned and operated by the employer, but they receive programme tapes free of charge from the Australian Broadcasting Commission. The programme time consists of about four hours daily and there is a programme delay of one week from the time of presentation by the originating station. The costs, to be borne by the employer, would consist of establishment costs of approximately \$50,000 with annual operating costs of \$30,000 to \$40,000.

It would appear that a repeater operation offers the only practicable means of providing a service to Leigh Creek in the near future, and this proposal has been put to local organisations at Leigh Creek during the recent visit to the district by an engineer of the Board. Otherwise, Leigh Creek, which is typical of many remote settlements throughout the Commonwealth, could not expect to receive a television service until, possibly, the introduction of services by means of satellites, which would probably be some time in the 1980's.

As you know, a senior engineer of the Board's staff, Mr S F Brownless, visited Leigh Creek during October last year, in order to address a public meeting attended by local authorities, and any other interested parties, on the difficulties associated with the provision of a television service to the area. I am told that, subsequent to the meeting Senator Jessop, who accompanied Mr Brownless during his visit to Leigh Creek, informed the former Postmaster-General that Mr Brownless had been most effective in his explanation of the technical and economic difficulties associated with providing television to remote areas of Australia, and that he had answered the various questions raised by the audience to their complete satisfaction.

Naturally, I am most keen to see television made available to as many people as possible in the relatively remote and sparsely populated areas throughout the Commonwealth still without service, and the Chairman of the Board has assured me that the Board has the question of the possibilities for the further development of services under continuing review, and will take advantage of any developments in technology which would enable a satisfactory television service to be extended to such low population areas at a cost which can be justified. Your representations in respect of Leigh Creek will most certainly be kept in mind in this regard.

In this quarter, Fee was still playing well on his wing, Willson at centre half forward was opening the game up, Daulby was winning the rucks, Wilton was a delight to watch with his high fliers, in fact, you could go right through the team and not find a player who was not pulling his weight.

Half time score: LC 7 - 10 Iron Knob 7 - 2

Iron Knob made positional changes, but to no avail after half time. The Leigh Creek boys could sense victory and they kept the pressure on. Willson was going great guns at centre half forward, Newman, spelling in the forward pocket with a damaged arm, was picking up a ton of kicks, Kamprod kept coming into his own on the ball and the whole team once more were playing terrific footy. In the back lines, Fisher did not put a foot wrong all day, Bould at full-back was doing good things ably assisted by Brand in the back pocket and you would think that Wilton had wings the way he was dragging down the big ones.

Third Quarter score: LC 11 - 16 Iron Knob 9 - 8

Leigh Creek started the last quarter with a 20 point lead. Was it enough? I was doubtful. Iron Knob went into attack and after some 15 minutes we saw a narrow 7 point difference. The turning point came when Iron Knob went into attack, slamming the ball out to their forward flank. Here we saw the mark of the day. Wilton flew high, head and shoulders above the opposition and pulled down a screamer, what a beautiful mark that was. He shot a long one across to Fee at centre wing who gathered it in, slammed the ball over to Willson in the forward pocket who at that time, found himself in a ton of trouble with 3 Iron Knob boys on him. Picking up the ball on the run, Willson back slipped, baulked, slammed the ball onto his left foot and placed it right through the middle (good football).

Full marks must go to the Leigh Creek lads. They were yards faster, they outmarked the opposition, their handball was a treat to watch and they played with the will to win.

Final Scores: LC 14 - 21 Iron Knob 12 - 11

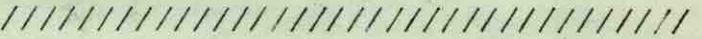
GREEN THUMB ADVISES

PRUNING: Roses & fruit trees can be pruned from now until mid August.

When pruning roses, try to cut out the older

branches and retain the young new growth. Cut back to an outward pointing bud and aim to keep the centre of the bushes open.

SHRUBS: Most shrubs & trees can be planted now although growth will be slow until weather warms in Spring. Spring FLOWERING ANNUALS should NOT be planted later than the end of the month. A fair range of VEGETABLES can be planted or sown now too, they include, onions, peas, cabbage, cauliflower, carrots, lettuce and broad beans.

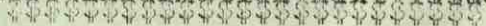

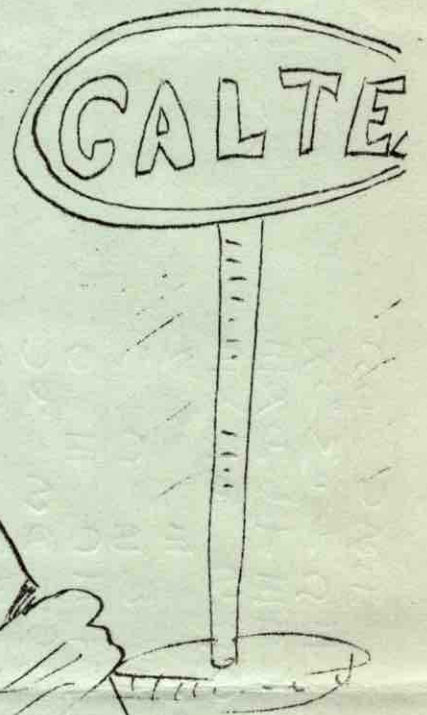
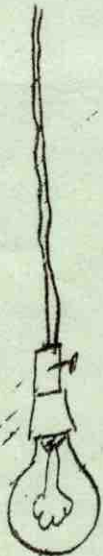
