GRAPE MILDUE

Spring is just around the corner, and since the last few years have been rather on the wet side, the population of Downy Mildue has built up. If our spring is wet this year, we can expect heavy infestations.

Bardeaux spray is the answer. If your vines suffered badly last yr spray them now before the buds burst. This is aimed at killing tiny spores of the fungus that have lodged in cracks & crevasses during the winter. Spray very thoroughly to ensure the spray gets right into where the spores are lodged.

The next spray should be carried out when the small shoots are about 4 inches long.

The 3rd spray should be applied when the flowers first appear.
This is a very important spray, as should the tiny fruits be infected at this stage, they will fall.

Remember also that different varieties flower at different times. Some are early, some late. (cont...'Bookshop' page)
