## <u>GARDEN COMPETITION</u>

This will be held in September from the 17 - 21 this year. Judging will be done on 17 and 18. Once again Mr Lothian from Adelaide Botanic Gardens will judge.

Because of the excellent season gardens should be at their best next month and we hope for a record number of entries. Once again the Trust has offered \$200 prize money.

Below are Mr Lothian's comments from last year: -

"Most competitors still lost points because they did not have examples for each of the sections on which the gardens are judged. Lack of vegetables and fruit in the Country Type Garden caused many loss of points another leature was the lack of colour.

This feature is possible by using quick growing annuals and yet there were surprisingly few entries which had these. Because most of these are easy to grow and make spectacular displays it was a pity that more thought had not been given to include them.

Tyres or other closed objects should not be placed around trees because these will ultimately interfere with their growth. Trees and shrubs in lawns will make a more attractive feature if they are grouped together rather than scattered. Maintenance is easier and, in addition, a sweep of lawn is preserved.

Because of improved appearance planting along the fence line on the outer side of a drive should be undertaken. This also reduces the amount of gravel which stores and reflects heat.

In the Country Type Garden, competitors should remember that apart from overall appearance it is essential that the garden should contain plenty of lawn and adequate shade, especially in relation to outdoor living, some colour and examples of fruit and vegetables. It is a section for the "easy to maintain garden."

While traditionally the Champion Garden is found among the Suburban Type Garden, it is possible in the future years that this could come from the Country Type Garden.

Owners of gardens who consider that the standard of their garden is unlikely to obtain a prize this year, should remember that an entry will ensure that they may be considered for the most improved section next year."

As the competition is only one month away final preparations should now be made. If lawns are fertilised this weekend they should be green within a month, Weeding and other general cleaning up should be completed.

Entry for a will be delivered to householders about two weeks before the competition. Additional copies will be available from J Zwar at Admin.

# NATIONAL PARKS & WILDLIFE SERVICE A Division of Department of Environment & Conversation

With the approach of School Holidays and the wildflower season beginning, now is a good time to remind you about a couple of items. Sturt peas are protected plants and you are not allowed to pick them. Take a few colour photos instead and leave the flowers for others to see and enjoy.

People wishing to shoot rabbits or other vermin should seek permission from the station owner <u>before-hand</u>. You should inform the owner if intending to do any travelling about on a property. He may not want people in certain areas at all. Also it is in your own interest in case of breakdown or accident for him to know where you will be.

Remember that nearly all native animals (including Kangaroos, Wallabies, all lizards and most birds) are totally protected and cannot be shot or caught.

Remember, too, that Aboriginal rock paintings and carvings have the protection of the law. These irreplaceable and virtually priceless relics of another society have survived for thousands of years in some cases. Inspect them and record them on film, but please leave them undamaged, for others to see.

If you do see anyone damaging or defacing aboriginal or historic relics, please note their car number and tell me or the police as soon as you can.

TREASURER 7 August 1973

Dear Wr Kelly,

The Treasurer has asked me to reply to your recent representations on behalf of the citizens of Leigh Creek, concerning the non-deductibility, for income tax purposes, of expenses incurred in purchasing medicines from their local store. You explained that the local store was the only place where medicines could be bought as there is no chemist shop in Leigh Creek.

At the outset, I think I should mention that neither the Treasurer nor the Commissioner of Taxation, who is responsible for the administration of the income tax law, has any personal discretion to allow any deduction not authorised by the law.

The Commissioner, who I asked to comment on this matter, has confirmed that the present income tax law allows deductions for "medical expenses" only within defined limits. As far as is relevant to the present issue, this term includes payments to a legally qualified chemist in respect of drugs and medicines for the treatment of an illness.

You will therefore appreciate that an amendment to the law would have to be passed by Parliament to permit deductions for drugs and medicines purchased from persons other than legally qualified chemists. Accordingly, I have arranged for your representations to be noted and the citizens you have mentioned may be assured that these will be kept in mind when the concessional deduction provisions of the income tax law are next under review.

The following is an excerpt from a letter to Mr N I Brealey, Chief Traffic Manager, Commonwealth Railways, PORT AUGUSTA, from Mr R Barber, Secretary of the Far Northern Development Assoc.

"At the Bi-ennial General meeting of the above Association on 29 June, 1973 and attended by Mr Hennning of the Commonwealth Railways, the Ghan running time and passenger accommodation was discussed.

A typical journey was made on the 31 May, 1973 leaving Adelaide at 7.35 am the train stopped on no less than 25 occasions between Adelaide and Telford and on 16 occasions before reaching Port Firie. In the overall trip the train was stationary for 3 hours and 22 minutes, with a total time of 11 hours and 6 minutes to Telford. Through a re-arrangement somewhere in the system the journey now takes 1 hour 48 minutes longer than 3 - 4 years ago, for no reason apparent to the traveller.

On changing trains at Port Pirie, some passengers are directed into the Lounge Car. While this vehicle is most suitable for what it was designed, it is a most uncomfortable vehicle to travel in for 7-8 hours.

It has been a complaint for several years, that passengers should not be asked to travel in this vehicle. A carriage with centre aisle access is the wish of most travellers.

The answer arrived back from Mr Brealey, and once more we have taken excerpts only:-

"We are certainly conscious of the need for providing the most expeditious service possible with the least inconvenience to travellers generally. In endeavouring to do this, the requirements of possengers travelling to and from Alice Springs and conveyance of motor cars on their behalf, must also be considered. Present arrangements are therefore satisfactory to the majority generally but the requirements of passengers travelling to and from intermediate locations are not disregarded. You will appreciate that there is now no restriction on those passengers travelling on the 'Ghan' to and from any location between Stirling North and Marree, which is a big improvement on the non air-conditioned services provided on goods trains some time ago, when travel on the 'Ghan' was subject to prior arrangement.

You may rest assured that as and when revision of the 'Ghan' timetable is necessary, the requirements of clients in your area will be considered.


With regard to the type of sitting up accommodation available on the 'Ghan' it is advised that we possess 5 cars only of the centre aisle type, three of which are worked on one consist and two on the other. Of necessity, these consists must be supplemented by spare rollingstock from Trans line guestion. The most suitable cars for this purpose are the lounge cars in the 'Ghan' in detraining passengers at intermediate locations, the passengers and their luggage be congregated in a particular car in the first and economy class sections of the train, on each side of the dining car. This arrangement has achieved results in reducing the time necessary for stop and avoided undue delays. It cannot be accepted that the lounge car in question is sub-standard and it is regretted that better alternatives are not available.
