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### COAL FACTS

NEW BROWN COAL SEAM. A new rich brown coal seam has been found in the Latrobe Valley, Victoria, by drilling carried out by the State Electricity Commission following a geophysical survey by Commonwealth Bureau of Mineral Resources.

Large reserves of open cut coal from 100 to 300 feet thick, under shallow overburden have been found. This find has made available a supply of coal that can be used without Briquetting. It can be used commercially and will be the cheapest coal, on calorific value, in Victoria.


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Our Surveyors working at "K" Cut have recently come along with this interesting bit of information.

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A promising asbestos deposit near Roberttown will be investigated by the S.A. Mines
Dept. to see if payable quantities can be
produced. The Premier (Mr. Playford) said
that a Mines Dept. geologist, Mr. D. King,
had first reported on the possibilities of
the deposit. This had been followed by a
more extensive investigation by a senior
geologist, Mr. L.W.Parkin, who considered
there was every prospect of large tonnages
of payable economic grade material being
mined.

#### CHURCH NEWS AND VIEWS

VIEWS: Last issue we discussed the A.V. or
Authorised Version of the Bible.

The middle of the 19th century saw much growth in the discovery of ancient manuscripts. Many found in this period were of greater age than those on which the bible or A.V. had been based.

Naturally the closer we can get to the original manuscripts the more accurate they are likely to be. Much of the new

material revealed minor errors, but some of them were of major importance. The task of revision was undertaken by the Church of England in 1870, and in 1831 the first copy of the R.V. or Revised Version was published. This Bible was not a revision of the language, but a revision of the text. It was closer to the original Scriptures in meaning, but not in language.

It is an interesting fact that the New Testament was written in Greek, not the classical, and faultless Greek of the Scholars, but the common almost 'slang,' Greek of the everyday man & woman.

Our Lord was not interested in delivering a highly intellectual grammatically perfect oration but in getting his message home, yet the King James Version or A.V. of the Bible has translated this simple almost slang Greek, into perfect classical English. Of course this has its value. Those familiar with its pages love the ring of its texts and the richness of its terms, BUT, that is now substitute for its understanding.

Realising this, Weymouth and James
Moffatt made their translations into
modern English. They actually went further than the R.V. went in presenting the
Bible in present day terms and phrases.

Let us leave it here. Next issue we will discuss what I consider to be the best, and as far as many scholars are concerned, the most accurate translation of them all.
