By all means let us raise the standard of living, provided we understand what living means. Were we as much concerned with our duties and responsibilities as we are with seeking after material comforts, our standard of living would be raised. Those duties & responsibilities are outlined for us in the Ten Commandments. They are the basic laws of human conduct, and should be our standard of living. If everyone were to observe all the Commandments, then it would indeed be a wonderful world. The more we study and understand them, the more we see how completely they regulate all our actions, the more we realise they are not mere restrictions of our liberty, but constitute a positive way of life. As seen in the light of Jesus Christ's summing up, they constitute the highest object of human endeavour. He reduced them to two main precepts:
"You shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart, with your whole soul, with all your strength and all your mind. You shall love your neighbour as yourself." "This do," He said, " and you shall Live."




