When I was asked to write this editorial I thought it would be comparatively easy. After numerous false starts and the use of quite a lot of paper I found that it wasn't so easy, so I finally decided to write about a subject which is rather a hobby horse of mine, namely Tolerance.

Tolerance can be applied to a lot of things, but I had in mind tolerance between people, either as individuals, as groups, or as nations, and takes the form of allowing the other chap the right to have a different point of view from our own.

This does not mean that there should be no discussion on points where a difference of opinion arises, but it should be remembered, as one writer recently put it, that even a broken clock is right twice in every twenty-four hours, and by the same token everyone is right on at least some points though they may be wide of the mark on others.

An old man once said to me, "My boy, always let the other chap give his views. He may be wrong, and quite often is, but if you let him have his say, sooner or later he will tell you something you want to know, and that makes all the rest worthwhile."

I have found this advice to be very sound over the years, especially when starting a new job or undertaking something or other off the beaten track, and it can be applied with success in everyday life as well; the catch is not to get too wound-up trying to convince the other chap that he is wrong so that you miss the information you want. You end up having, on the one hand, listened to what you consider to be a lot of rubbish, and on the other, probably antagonised your opponent, all for nothing. for nothing.

Human nature being what it is, the tendency is to become something like the "Big Business Tycoon" in American humour, and ride rough-shod over the opinions of others, so that in time they have no opinions to offer. A business or organisation being only as good as the collective ideas of the people in it, has reached a peak when this happens, and the road from then on can only lead downward, no matter how slowly.
