An amazing feature of the Australian worker is his complacent attitude towards his own welfare.

Daily we read in our newspapers of tremendous profits being made by the big firms, of increased prices for our basic needs, of millions being spent non-productively, of the resources of our country being sold overseas at bargain prices, of shortages and of gluts.

At the same time we know, or should know, that our wages are "frozen" preventing us from receiving even a fair share of the wealth we produce.

We do nothing to rectify the position and in some cases express horror when some section or sections of our kind make a positive effort to improve their lot.

Of course we are told repeatedly that any increase in our pay envelopes would create all manner of chaos within the nation's financial structure. Why, then, do not the excessive profits create this chaos? At least, if the worker receives more money it is circulated within the country and does not, at least not directly, go into the sweller of the swell of th into the swollen coffers of overseas money lenders.

We are constantly being told that industry cannot afford to pay labour more; yet industry can declare record dividends year after year and excuse itself by claiming that this creates employment.

This I refute by saying that if the demand for an article exists and the money is available to produce it (as it most certainly is) then the article will be produced whether by a man interested in profit or by a Government interested in the welfare of its people. The Government, of course, obtains the necessary money originally by taxation, and the logical person to tax is the man with the money. This is why the financial giants behind the newspapers would have This is why the financial giants behind the newspapers would have us believe that the only way to finance an industry is to guarantee large profits.

Surely it is common justice that if wages are pegged then profits should be similarly pegged. If the capitalists are so eager, as they claim, to rescue the country from its dire financial position, they would accept cut profits willingly, thereby reducing prices and exporting more. But no! When the pinch is to be felt it is the worker who must feel it and he does, and will continue to do so until the pinch becomes an unbearable sche. Then he will do so until the pinch becomes an unbearable ache. Then he will ask how such a state of affairs came to pass and who is going to ease it for him.

As always a leader will be found to lift the workers back onto a comfortable footing and, having done so, will be criticised, maligned and voted into obscurity until such time as the chain of events repeats itself.

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

Well now, Leigh Creek!


I can give you some news this time. The Collins' have managed to get away, after having what seemed to be considerable trouble with their trucking arrangements.
