The small shops cater for the customer who likes personal service, and in that way they build a sound business with regular customers. On the other hand, the large stores rely mainly on gaining the interest of customers by various methods, such as sales, demonstrations and lavish window displays.

How do customers in this area share in business competition? They do reasonably well. All business houses in Leigh Creek have a large burden to carry, but nevertheless they offer reasonable service to the community under most trying conditions: they are constantly trying to improve service and keep prices at a fair level, which is a mighty effort, when freight and other factors are taken into consideration.
