We don't hear, but the murmurings of those left all mean, "He was dealt good cards, but he played them badly".


Let us resolve therefore to play the strong game; give particular care to detail as well as to the big problems we face from day to day. Cards played thus will make us sure winners in this great game of Life.







"KEEP ON SERVING"

Anzac Day is with us again.

The returned soldier looks back to the past and honours his fallen comrades and honours the cause for which he fought, Democracy and Peace.

His return to civilian life brought him once again into the arena of the everyday troubles and struggles, happinesses and sadnesses of ordinary living.

On Anzac Day the returned man makes a reassessment of his experiences and asks himself... "Am I doing enough to see that the causes for which I fought are still upheld... am I helping people in their everyday lives am I playing a part in the League and in community activities?" The answer often is - and should always be - a definite "Yes."

Take the Distress Fund as an instance.

Last year it paid out £16,179, comprising 6,810 separate payments.

As time passes the demands on the Fund are growing heavier. Its main support comes from the Anzac Day Appeal, which last year raised £19,153.

Support for the Appeal is just one way in which the returned man can show not only a League, but a community spirit.

The returned soldier has it squarely in front of him, particularly on Anzac Day, to play an increasing role in civic affairs, where his initiative and experience is devoted to the service of his fellow citizen.
