Rushing to off-load, Mr. Edwards safely threw off his suitcases, & much later remembered that his camera, valued at about £50 was still in the glove-box.

The vehicle was towed to Hawker by Mr. F. Teague, and Mr. Edwards spent the rest of the trip as Mr. Wurst's passenger, no doubt feeling that it just wasn't his day.

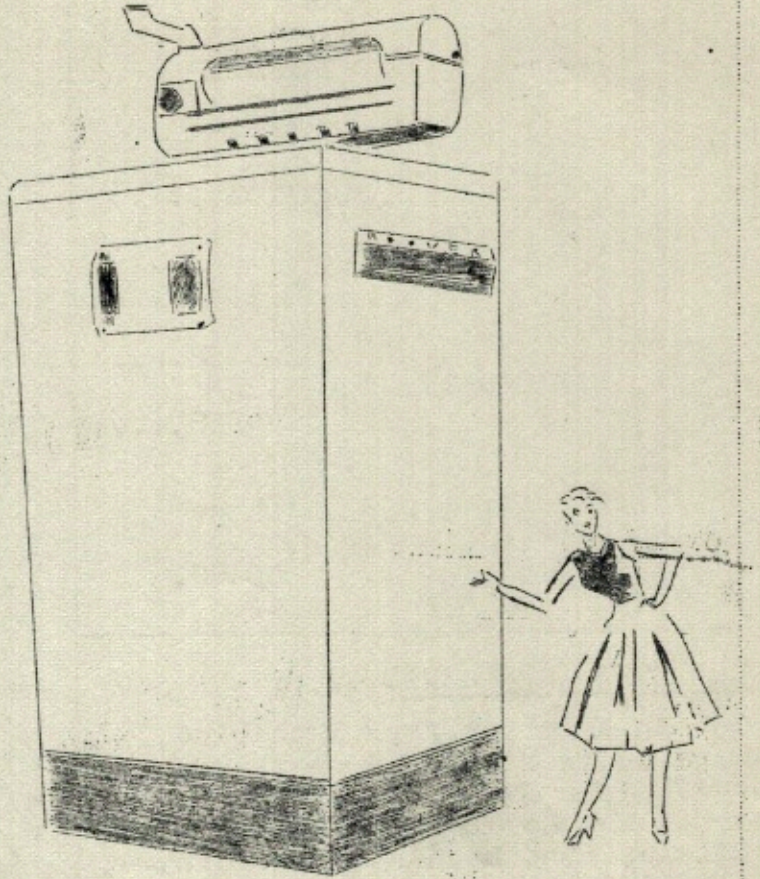



Mr. O'Halloran spoke of the improvements and changes that are taking place in the town and of the hospitality which he and Mr. Hutchins had received.


Assisted by the R.S.L. Sub-Branch President, Mr. A. Faddy, Mr. O'Halloran presented the trophies which had been won during the afternoon.

In the evening a Ball was held in the Community Hall. It was estimated that the attendance was approximately 250.


