Recent reflection has confirmed the belief that "TOPICS!" creed is meant to be a true reflection of local affairs. With this idea mainly, I've settled to write these few lines. The theme, of course, is "The Single Man and his Predicament in Leigh Creek."

This does not claim to be a philosophical article on human behav-

iour nor a psychological analysis of mining towns but a closer investigation of common facts. It is my desire to convey my impressions to a wider field than the few friends who, in general, share these views.

The single man whose social position has been a problem in Leigh Creek since the beginning of its prosperity has also had his own problems during that time. This position now seems to be deteriorating, because by the evolution of time the magnied man and his family reduced because by the evolution of time the married man and his family reduce the single man's importance. By, possibly, misunderstanding, and perhaps not excluding jealousy, the single man is ill-fitted in the atmosphere commonly referred to as Society. It is here that society has the best opportunity to undergo self-examination.

I do not wish to suggest the best method of effecting a solution or even easing the existing tension: that is a matter of individual adjustment and outlook.

We all belong to the same great human family and it does not really matter what our race, creed or nationality. If the families, who at present make up a large proportion of the town's inhabitants, do not extend their hands in welcome I am sure the single man will retire not extend their hands in welcome I am sure the single man will retire further into the background and play a continually diminishing part in township affairs. Because of his lack of family ties, the single man is able to contribute just as much to the general well-being of our community as the family, except that the social amenities and respect which he is receiving cannot be favourably compared. The barriers between the two, however, are in many cases overpowering good intentions. Because of different suppossibilities we build different standards and have a different outlook to civilen problems.

Leigh Creek, particularly for a single man, is not a place one easily falls in love with, and it is not for the sake of admiration that people are coming here. Every individual (except those born here) has his own conviction concerning the circumstances which influenced his decision to come here; circumstances which he seldom reveals to his fellowmen. Whatever may have been our reasons for coming to Leigh Creek, it is not the past that matters now that we are living here together as a community - it is the present and the future which now has

significance.

The single man, however, has no wish to become a usurper and to thrust himself into the social circle, but of necessity therefore must await the initiative of the householder.

My intention in these lines has not been to emphasize mistakes which are mainly committed by lack of interest for another's welfare, but merely to give those who read these lines something to think about and thus find for themselves that all human beings possess something mutual.

This is written by a single man who considers himself very fortunate. How the others feel is a question for the reader.
