This year the Poles expect to mine more coal than Belgium, Italy and France together.


MINE TUNNELING RECORD BROKEN IN SOUTH AFRICA

Claimed to be a record 1,230 ft. of 11 ft. by 10 ft. tunnel was driven in 26 working days at Durban Roodepoort Deep, a South African Mine where a tunnel 8,000 feet below the surface, was opened.

Drilling and loading were done simultaneously and altogether 11,000 tons of rock was broken and loaded by a Swedish made, mine loader.

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
