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RICH NICKEL FIND


Drilling for nickel has commenced in a 400 square mile area near Mount Davies. Mount Davies is in the extreme north-west corner of South Australia, about 500 miles as the crow flies from Leigh Creek. Recently the S. A. Executive Council consented to the issue of a special 2 year mining lease to South-West Mining Ltd., a new private company to search for nickel and other minerals in the area.

The company was formed recently by Nickel Mines of Australia Ltd., and an un-

named company believed to be the International Nickel Company of Canada.

The site of the lease is described as a large area of basic & ultra-basic igneous rocks, which, elsewhere in the world, are the all important source rock of chromium, nickel and platinum minerals.

S.A. Mines Dept., crews are now in the area testing the site.


The X-Ray Unit visited our town and caused some excitement.




The School Committee has made arrangements for a Ball to be held in September. the holidays and Mr. R. Hasse has generously donated three prizes for the children selling the most tickets.

VIEWS

No doubt many are puzzled by the letters which appear in brackets before the Biblical quotation under the heading "Thought for this Issue." (AV)(RV) & (RSV).

A.V. the first English version of the Scriptures made by direct translation from the original Hebrew and Greek, and the first to be printed, was the work of William Tyndale. He met bitter opposition.

He was accused of wilfully perverting the meaning of the Scriptures, and his New Testaments were ordered to be burned as,

"untrue translations." He was finally betrayed into the hands of his enemies, and in October 1536, was publicly executed and burned at the stake.

His translation though, became the foundation of subsequent English versions, notably those of Coverdale 1535; Thomas Matthew, 1537; the Great Bible, 1539; the Geneva Bible, 1560; and the Bishops Bible, 1568. In 1582 a translation of the New Testament, made from the Latin Vulgate by Roman Catholic scholars, was published at Rheims.

In 1611 King James authorized his translators to take into account the preceeding translations and produce as accurate a version as was possible in the light of contemporary scholarship.

This is the A.V. "the authorised version."

It is this Bible which most of us possess.

"It's simplicity, its dignity, its power, its happy terms of expression," has through the years made it beloved by those who read it.

"It entered, as has no other book, into the making of the personal character and public institutions of the English-speaking peoples.

We owe it an incalculable debt."
