Most of us newcomers were very happy when, after 4-5 very rough post-war years, we landed safely in this country, which we had chosen for our second homeland.

It was not so easy to part with our past, to leave behind everybody, and everything we once had possessed, had loved and lived for.
When we arrived here, many of us empty-handed, our situation was not as rosy as most of the people who received us thought.

The wounds of the parting were not yet healed when we had to start our new life in a strange country with its hundred new customs and habits.

Often a small thing upsets a person and makes him feel unhappy. Did you ever think, besides the language difficulties, how many other things there were to get used to before we felt ourselves comfortable and at home?

I cannot speak for everyone and say "back home" was like that, because we came from as many as twenty different countries, some of us from famous European capital cities, some of us from small villages. I presume that if I give you my own first impressions you can make yourself a general picture of the problems facing a newcome? newcomer.

My first shock came when I heard "the railways are on strike": that a country should be left without rail traffic seemed incredible

to a European.

My second came when the bus which took us to our first destination stopped and we were covered by flies: the first good meal that we received after 35 days of sea-journey was spoiled, because my two hands turned cut not to be enough to keep the flies out of my plate and away from my face.

One of my biggest surprises was when I found out where our

drinking water comes from. For a very long time I watched suspiciously the flock of birds on our roof.
I did not understand why our camp was deserted after work. My curiosity inclined me to join the others next day and find out the reason. I found myself rushing to the bar. But what a disappointment there! No tables, no chairs, no waiters, a big crowd of people standing in a circle, 6 - 7 behind each other. It looked hopeless, so I left. But with the rising of the temperature my thirst rose too, and next time I succeeded with a good deal of elbow-work in

breaking through the crowd and satisfying my thirst.

Once we had enough money, we planned a good week-end in the city. On Saturday afternoon the city looked deserted and we found out the races were on, When evening came we decided to have a good dinner, but the restaurants were closed by then, and being strangers we could not find a place where we could still get a meal. Next morning we arose very hungry, hurrying for what we thought a good breakfast, but every place was still closed. (At home on a Sunday morning we generally went first to an early church service and afterwards to a non-stop cinema, in the afternoon to a soccer-match or theatre, and finally to a good restaurant, where we had dinner and later danced.) We came home from our week-end very low-spirited.

Think of the poor ladies, who came from big cities and had to start their new life in the country, surrounded by cattle, horses and pigs - or of the trouble of the non-English speaking housewife, who had to work out the weight of her menu ingredients in pounds and cunces, when all her recipes were based on kilogramms, dekagramms

and gramms.

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

Here is the great truth of that old saying -



gate at age 25.


Mr. & Mrs. Keane and their


Then they issued a solemn edict: roosters must not crow between dusk and dawn.
