16-STOREY MOBILE SHOVEL.


Called "The Mountaineer", the largest shovel ever built in America is at work removing 90-ton bites of earth from coal seams in eastern Ohio. Towering 16 stories in the air and weighing 5½ million pounds, it is said to be the largest unit of mobile land machinery. 



Australia received more assisted European migrants in 1955 than any other country.

The Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration states that just under 54,000 Europeans migrated to Australia during the year.

Twenty thousand migrants went to the United States and 15,000 to Argentina.

Altogether, 120,000 Europeans migrated last year under the auspices of ICEM.

****** WHERE MUCH OF THE WORLD'S GOLD LIES.

Sixty-five feet below sealevel, in the rock beneath the Second District Federal Reserve Bank of New York, glitter some 7,000 tons of pure gold bricks which are worth 8 billion dollars. This gold is the security for the paper currency of 60 foreign Governments and some world institutions like the International Bank.

As the balance of internation -al trade changes, the men who work in this bullion stronghold move the gold bricks from one country's cell to another.

54,000 MIGRANTS HERE VIA I.C.E.M. This is done so that each country can know specifically what is theirs in fact. Each brick weighs about 27 lb., and the gold is of the very finest and is much soft-er than the gold used in jewellery. Great care has to be taken

that the bricks are not dropped.
Auditors from time to time have
to have the endless brick walls taken down brick by brick and reassembling them in new piles to ensure that each country has its

right amount.

Very large amounts of gold went to the United States during the Second World War for safe keeping. Many of the gold crates arrived in boxes hastily addressed to "The Federal Reserve Bank of New York," to which they had been shipped at the height of an in-vasion or Governmental upset.

The Central Watch Room for this vault is protected by bullet proof glass and a maze of dials, signal lights, buzzers and bells to give split second warning of trouble.


