Some weeks ago the people of our local committee who arranged for the Whyalla trip wrote to that town suggesting a 'return' visit to Leigh Creek for some of their children. The response was immediate, and on Friday afternoon, 24th August, 40 children accompanied by two teachers arrived in a large bus to spend a week-end.

Friendships made in Whyalla were eagerly renewed, new acquaintances as eagerly sought, and within five minutes of the arrival of the bus the children all had a special friend. The children then enjoyed a hearty tea prepared at the school by the Ladies of the Welfare Club, following which they were formally welcomed and told of the plans made for their visit.

Saturday morning was spent in a tour of our town, and the open cut workings and machines, much time being spent gazing at and looking over the 9-W dragline and searching with some small degree of success for

'fossils' amongst pieces of shale.

In the afternoon all the children and many local parents went out to Aroona Dam. All had a good look around, and quite a few of the children promptly tried themselves out at being mountain goats by promptly disappearing over various hills. After a final muster the count was correct and the entire party proceeded a mile back toward Leigh Creek where members of the committee had assembled the necessities for a barbeque tea. The children set to with gusto to enjoy their chops (three sheep in quantity!), bread and butter, ice-cream, soft drink, apples, oranges and lollies, as only children can - and what did they do then? They went hill-climbing again!

For the evening, a suitable number of seats had been reserved at the cinema, and shortly before starting time some 80 children arrived

and took their places in a very orderly manner.

Next morning, after packing of bags, exchanges of addresses and "don't forget to writes" the children from Whyalla boarded their many bus. With many cheery farewells between the children (and even a tear or two, I noticed) and breaking of dozens of streamers they started on their trip home.

The weather during their stay was beautiful; there were no accidents or casualties and the week-end went off as planned, the teachers and the children saying what a delightful time they had enjoyed. (concluded overleaf ....)
